What Grace Can Give by Pastor Jim Fleming

"I will pour out on the house of David and on the inhabitants of Jerusalem, the Spirit of grace and of supplication, so that they will look on Me whom they have pierced; and they will mourn for Him, as one mourns for an only son, and they will weep bitterly over Him like the bitter weeping over a first-born" (Zechariah 12:10).

I was discussing religious issues with a Jew who fancied himself an enlightened soul. Our conversation soon confirmed his opinion that he and I did not occupy the same circle. I asked if I could pray for him. He agreed, on the condition that I did not pray "in Jesus' name." Apparently, his "enlightenment" did not include a very bright view of Jesus.

He is one from the larger company of most Jews whose views of Jesus range from disinterest and disdain to passionate hatred. Against the backdrop of this prevailing opinion, Zechariah 12:10 describes an astounding future event. There will come a day when Israel will experience a complete change of heart, a reversal of views so profound it defies human understanding. God will be the only explanation. Pouring out His Spirit of grace upon Israel will make all the difference in the world.

Here is how it will play out. Just prior to Jesus' second coming, cold hearts will begin warming. By the time He becomes clearly visible, this brokenness will have come to a full boil. It will overflow in a torrent of tears. The hearts of Israel will be so utterly broken, their heartache can only be compared to that of parents who have lost an only son. Behold the face of Jesus! The One whom they rejected and consigned to death; the One now resplendent in glory; He is God's anointed Messiah.



Now here is a truly remarkable and surprising insight. Did you catch it? We conceive of God's grace as something which fills us with joy. (It is, to be sure.) But in the day Zechariah sees, the most abject sorrow is produced by grace. God's grace does produce joy, but sometimes it produces brokenness.

Remember the Sermon on the Mount? "Blessed are those who mourn, for they shall be comforted" (Matthew 5:4). One of the best things we can do is to grieve over the things that break God's heart. When we lose that brokenness, when we become comfortable with sin, when we feel enlightened and proud of something for which God says we should be ashamed, we need grace!

Sometimes all that stands between us and seeing what a mess we have made of things, how wrong headed we have been, how off-track we have slipped, is God's grace. Don't ask Him to replace those tears, thank Him for them. Thank God for those moments when He removes our natural complacency and comfort with sin, allowing us to share His profound sorrow and loathing for what we have done, or thought, or become.

Are you feeling sad and broken over something you have experienced that dishonors God? Praise God for such works of grace! The grace of such great sorrow is a prelude to change. Thank Him for it and allow the pain to work itself into the very pores of your spirit. Those grace-filled tears can wash away sin's dullness and stir a longing to live for the Lord with pure abandon.



Gracing the Path by Ken Eriksen, Transition Committee Chairman, Vice Chairman of the Session

If you have a dog, you inevitably have walked your dog. If your dog is like my Molly, she takes me for sniffer-walks; she walks, stops, and sniffs anything and everything! One of our favorite places to walk is the wooded trails at Lucius Burch State Natural Area. The shade provides respite from the blazing sun. But after a rain, especially a gully washer, some trails become swamped and are not that passable. (Molly thinks otherwise!). To avoid getting muddy, trail users find ways around the muddy spots. After a while, a new path emerges. However, the path is no longer straight; it's more circuitous. Ideally, it would be great to fill in the low muddy spots to keep a straighter path rather than make new paths to avoid a messy situation!

Going back to Nehemiah, as we have seen him in previous Shepherd's Staff posts, he encountered muddy situations on the pathway of <u>rebuilding the walls of Jerusalem</u>. He faced <u>challenges from those outside</u> the city who were taunting the Israelites, wanting to stop the work, and he encountered a mess on the inside among and between the Israelites. Nehemiah approached the internal discord with grace to keep focused on the path ahead.

From the fifth chapter of his book, Nehemiah learned that fellow Israelites were being charged interest by other Israelites for money borrowed to buy food during a famine.



This was wrong and needed to be addressed. Nehemiah chose a direct pathway to confront those committing such grievances against fellow Israelites. He brought together the "nobles and officials," telling them their actions against fellow Israelites were wrong. Those nobles and officials were mired in the mud, knowing they had done wrong to their fellow brothers and sisters. Nehemiah told the nobles and officials to "return to them this very day their fields, their vineyards, their olive orchards, and their houses, and the percentage of money, grain, wine, and oil that you have been exacting from them" (Nehemiah 5:11).

The nobles and officials agreed and said, "we will restore these and require nothing from them. We will do as you say." After this, they said "Amen" and "praised God" (Nehemiah 5:12-13).

Nehemiah exercised a grace strategy on behalf of the affected Israelites to set straight a hurt against them. The nobles and officials confessed, repented, and worshipped God. Through this the people were unified and continued rebuilding the wall of Jerusalem.

Grace restoration is not new but is something we need continual reminding and teaching on. Pastors Jim, Ken, Jake, and Taylor led us through a "Graces of Reconciliation" sermon series this summer. During the last sermon, Pastor Jim challenged us to practice speaking grace between and among one another, directing our attention to A Commitment to Speak Grace card for our use.

Have you shown grace to others in the last month? Way to go! Can't wait to hear about it on October 23.

Carrying on the Work -1 Corinthians 16:10

by Jan Carrier Global Missions Team Member One of the joys of a missionary is to find a "Timothy" in their midst. David Stevens found his "Timothy" in **Désiré Beadoum** who lives in Chad. After Désiré completed the Thompson Study Bible training, David saw a man with exceptional giftedness to teach the Word and equip church leaders. Désiré co-taught with David in Senegal, Niger, and the Ivory Coast.

The problem was that Désiré had only a little formal training. Eighty-five percent of the churches in the world are led by men and women who have little formal training in theology. Knowing that 8 out of 10 nationals that come to the USA for education never return, David encouraged Désiré to attend Evangelical Theological Seminary in Cameroon. The hurdle was that Désiré had a wife and seven children. How could a pastor with a family save enough funds to afford formal training?

This is where you, First Evan, have been the answer, thanks to your giving to the Missions Fund. The Global Missions Team has allocated several thousand dollars from the Missions Fund to assist

"Timo-David's thy." Désiré is completing the second year of his formal education for his degree. M.Div. This will better equip him in his pastoral duties in Chad and becoming one



of the primary trainers in Frenchspeaking countries in Africa for the Thompson Study Bible. In the next few years David hopes to pass on his role of training future teachers to Désiré. Thank you, First Evan!

In-Life Pluska English Camp, Czech Republic, July 16-23, 2022 by Tori Martin, Missions Assistant

Czech Republic has amazing architecture and a wealth of history, including church history. An important aspect of Czech history is their recent break from Communism in 1989. Many of the people we met at English camp were children of those who grew up in Communism or were very young when Communism fell.

Growing up under Communism in Czech Republic, the consensus tends to be: all forms of organized religion are bad and only a tool for control as the Soviet Union displayed from 1948–1989 by infiltrating the Catholic Orthodox churches for that purpose specifically—control.

As a result, this scarred country wanted nothing to do with religion. But our Jesus tugged at the hearts of many, showing His love was not a form of control, but the ultimate and true form of freedom (Galatians 5:1). In-Life, the Christian organization we served with that week, is a result of that "tugging". I met so many that completely understood the freedom Jesus gives by taking our penalty on the cross.

One of these that understood this freedom was my friend Bětka (bee-yet-kuh). She is 17 years old and completing her last year of high school. She is a professional ballroom dancer, a Ukulele player, and an exceptional hiker! I had the honor of getting to know her that week. The Holy Spirit leading in her life and her desire to know Jesus was evident in every conversation, smile, and hug she gave. I watched her become more confident and become someone those in her small group looked up to. She has been reading through the Bible and she told me a couple of weeks ago that she finished Matthew and asked me what my favorite part of the Bible was...so she could choose what to read next!
